

Souper Bowl of Caring

Trinity's youth will hold soup pots at the church doors on Souper Bowl of Caring Sunday, February 7, 2010. They will join young people in churches across the country to collect money for those who are hungry and hurting. In 2009, over 13,000 groups participated in the Souper Bowl of Caring, generating over \$10 million. All of the money collected is donated to a charity selected by the participant; none of the money is sent to the Souper Bowl of Caring headquarters. Organizers ask only that each participant report their collection, so national totals can be determined and announced. Since the Souper Bowl of Caring began in 1990, more than \$60 million has gone to help people in need. Please support the youth of our church in this effort to "love our neighbors" by dropping your dollar in the soup pot on February 7th.

Hunger and Poverty Statistics

POVERTY

- In 2008, 39.8 million people (13.2 percent) were in poverty.
- In 2008, 14 million (19 percent) children under the age of 18 were in poverty.

FOOD INSECURITY AND VERY LOW FOOD SECURITY

- In 2008, 49.1 million Americans lived in food insecure households, 32.4 million adults and 16.7 million children.
- In 2008, 14.6% percent of households (17.1 million households) were food insecure, an increase from 11.1 percent (13.0 million households) in 2007.
- In 2008, households with children reported food insecurity at almost double the rate for those without children, 21.0 percent compared to 11.3 percent.
- In 2008, households that were more likely to experience food insecurity were households with children (21.0 percent), households with children headed by single women (37.2 percent) or single men (27.6 percent), households with incomes below the poverty line (42.2 percent), Black non-Hispanic households (25.7 percent) and Hispanic households (26.9 percent).
- In 2008, 8.1 percent of households with seniors (2.3 million households) were food insecure

USE OF EMERGENCY FOOD ASSISTANCE AND FEDERAL FOOD ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

- In 2008, 4.1 percent of all U.S. households (4.8 million households) accessed emergency food from a food pantry one or more times.
- In 2008, food insecure households were 13 times more likely than food-secure households to have obtained food from a food pantry.
- In 2008, food insecure households were 14 times more likely than food-secure households to have eaten a meal at an emergency kitchen.
- In 2008, 55.0 percent of food-insecure households participated in at least one of the three major Federal food assistance programs – Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (formerly the Food Stamp Program), The National School Lunch Program, and the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children.

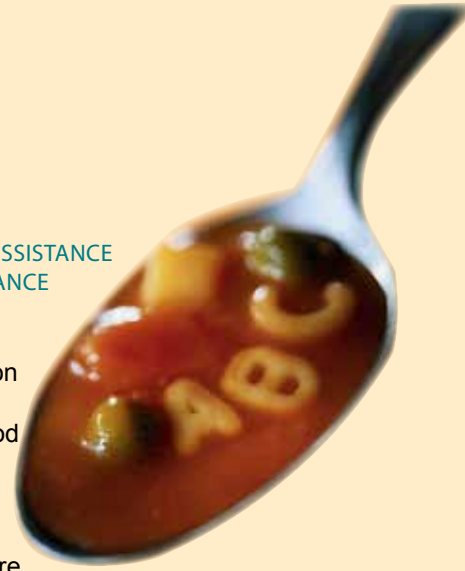
Ten states exhibited statistically significant higher household food insecurity rates than the national average (12.2%):

Sounds of Freedom and Hope

A weekend of music with renowned musician and theologian, Dr. Jeremy Begbie.

In February Dr. Jeremy Begbie will join us for two days of music and conversation about the myriad ways that music enriches and deepens the life of faith. On Saturday morning, the Atlanta community is invited to join us as Dr. Begbie uses multimedia to explore the richness of music's contribution to theological insight. Following the lecture, there will be lunch and a time for questions and answers for anyone who is interested in deepening the conversation with Begbie. On Sunday morning Dr. Begbie will offer a second lecture, during the church school hour, for all who are interested. He will then preach during the 11 a.m. service. Musicians and any who appreciate good music will not want to miss this rich opportunity.

Jeremy Begbie teaches systematic theology, specializing in the interface between theology and the arts. He has taught widely, through multimedia performance-lectures, on the interplay between music and theology. Begbie has recently been appointed as the inaugural holder of the Thomas A. Langford Research Professorship in Theology at Duke Divinity School, and Founding Director of Duke Initiatives in Theology and the Arts. He is also Senior Member at Wolfson College, Cambridge, and an Affiliated Lecturer in the Faculties of Divinity and Music at the University of Cambridge. His most recent book, *Resounding Truth: Christian Wisdom in the World of Music* (Baker/SPCK), won the Christianity Today 2008 Book Award in the theology/ethics category.

The Sound of Freedom: Music of Liberation

For centuries musicians have combined sounds to create rich and attractive harmony. Jeremy Begbie will show how this apparently simple fact provokes us to re-think what it means to be free. Through harmonious music, we hear a kind of "space" which, unlike the space we can see with our eyes, involves intense togetherness while preserving and promoting difference. This is the heart of Christian freedom: we become free as we enable each other to be free. Begbie will show how different kinds of music can serve to embody this great truth. The lecture will include extensive use of performed and recorded music.

For those who are interested in going deeper, Dr. Begbie will continue the conversation in an informal question- and-answer format.

The Sound of Hope: Music in the Spirit

What does it mean to live in hope? How can we be hopeful while taking suffering and lament seriously? Jeremy Begbie will show how music can open up this rich theme, offering fresh and novel ways of understanding and experiencing the shape of Christian hope in our time. In a culture that finds it so hard to hope for anything in the long term, music can bear its own kind of witness to this future-directed dimension of Christian faith. The lecture will include extensive use of performed and recorded music.

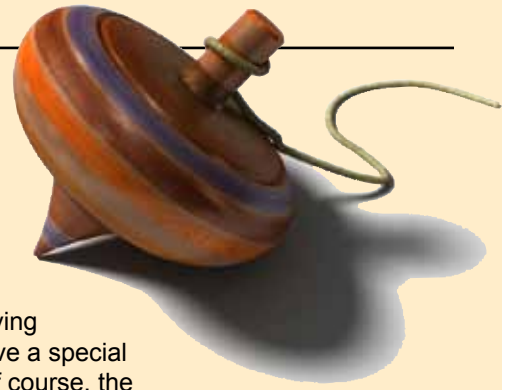
