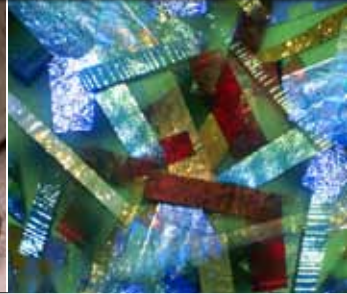

The Sounds of Trinity

You've heard them: footsteps in the hallway outside Dobbs Chapel.

On Sundays, despite our best efforts to walk softly, the hallway comes alive with the sound of wing-tips and pumps connecting with marble. As worshipers make their way to Sunday School classes or services, the clipped rhythm echoes off the high ceiling, reminding us that we are present in God's house.

Those footfalls are among the many Trinity sounds that allow us to feel connected to people, place, and our faith.

There's the squeal of children in the Playplace. Laughter. Sometimes tears.

The repeated murmur of "Cup of Salvation," as we pass the communion wine.

The repeated thump of a basketball in the gym. Bang – off the rim. Bang – off the backboard. Bang – off the rim again. Then, swoosh. (A satisfied smile makes no sound.)

Our answer to a Bible reading: "Thanks be to God."

The belly laugh of a long time member as he slaps yet another back in greeting.

The voices of the choir effortlessly reaching for a note that lifts the soul.

The whistle of a fishing reel letting out line and the delighted laughter of a teen reeling in some much-needed love.

The loud, clear voice of challenge from the pulpit, helping us discern and understand.

The repeated "just one!" from anxious

moms in Williams Hall who know the consequences of children in possession of too many chocolate chip cookies.

The shuffle of papers as a sermon ends and we collectively reach for the responsive reading.

The clink of metal hangers, as more clothing gets hung on racks at the Women's Shelter.

The thunder of Trinity's mighty organ as Norman MacKenzie ends a service with mighty blast of Widor, sending us out into the world charged with the Holy Spirit.

The rhythm of discussion in a Session meeting. Anxious questions. Explanation in detail. Confident decisions.

Those footfalls are among the many Trinity sounds that allow us to feel connected to people, place, and our faith.

The chuckles at Five Points of those too late for Sunday School and too early for Church. An unofficial communion that can be as meaningful as a heartfelt prayer.

The thunder of hammers on the siding of a new Habitat House.

The clink of children's coins as the offering plate is passed. (You have to listen carefully to hear the almost imperceptible flick of an envelope with a check.)

Please join us as Trinity Explores presents a stimulating series of lessons comparing the four gospels of the biblical canon with others that “missed the cut,” such as the Gospel of Thomas, the Infancy Gospel of James, the Gospel of Mary Magdalene, and many more. Come hear the fascinating story of the differences and sometimes surprising similarities among Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, which are part of our historically accepted canon of scripture, and the many intriguing and often insightful “non-canonical” gospels, which are not.

Vernon K. Robbins, Professor of New Testament and Comparative Sacred Texts in the Department and Graduate Division of Religion at Emory University, will lead this exciting series. His seminal work, *Jesus the Teacher: A Socio-Rhetorical Interpretation of Mark*, launched socio-rhetorical criticism as a creative and productive component of New Testament studies.

The Collectors' Salons will be held Sunday afternoons from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. Reservations must be made through the church office at 404-237-6491. Numbers are limited, on the basis of the space of the collection.

Trinity is fortunate to have many members who surround themselves with the creative output of artists. Since 2006, seven of these collections have been opened for members to share that visual treat, and to have the opportunity to hear about the pieces in these collections from their collectors.

Again this year, COLLECTORS' SALONS will be held on the same Sundays as the Fall and Spring Music Festivals, giving two full days of experiencing the joys of the arts. These events offer a time for Trinity members to socialize and to share these experiences with others who have similar interests. Together they learn about the art works, as their owners' share their knowledge and their passion for collecting. It is a chance to explore visually these works with someone who knows them intimately, and an opportunity to expand your knowledge and understanding of these artistic creations.

These visits take place on Sunday afternoons from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. Reservations must be made through the church office at 404.237.6491. Numbers are limited, on the basis of the space of the collection. Directions will be provided.

The fall Collectors' Salon will be held on Sunday, November 21, when there is an opportunity to go into the home of Elsie and Jim Henderson. Jim says, "One of the privileges of being involved at the High Museum over the years has been the opportunity to see many extraordinary private collections. Having seen these Collections, we are reluctant to call the art in our home a Collection –maybe a collection with a lower case "c." It has been assembled over the years with one guiding (but not organizing or curatorially important) principle – we have acquired primarily paintings, photographs, lithographs, and drawings we like."

The art is modern and contemporary, but surprisingly figurative. There is a little bit of folk art. There are works of a number of living and deceased artists- some reasonably well known local ones such as Roccio Rodriguez, Carolyn Carr, Don Cooper, Mattie Lou O'Kelley; regionally known ones, such as Ida Kohlmeyer; and some national and internationally artists such as Georg Baselitz, Milton Avery, Jennifer Bartlett, Roberto Juarez, Robert Mapplethorpe, and Hans Hoffman.

The responsive "Amen."

Did you know that the Trinity Flower Guild is celebrating its first anniversary as a new ministry under the umbrella of Worship and Music? We are 23 members "strong" and have had three training workshops since our inception last fall. We arrange the flowers on the second Sunday of each month and take great care and experience much joy in doing this. Our most recent workshop teacher, Alvin Moore, reminded us that arranging flowers for worship is a ministry and is our effort to give something back in appreciation for the talents we have been given. It is a personal gift to God, and if we do our best it will always be good enough. Alvin is head of the Flower Guild at All Saints which arranges all flowers that are placed in their church.

We have chosen to begin with just one Sunday a month, but we are learning all the time, and you may see some more variety as we get bolder and more confident. We work with the

flower donors and try to honor special requests, but we also try to choose the best flowers for the time of the year and for the liturgical colors in the sanctuary. You can be confident that we are anxious to please the congregation and are learning new ways to express the meaning of the liturgical calendar.

Our budget is small, and we are good stewards of it, but we would like to have more opportunities to arrange flowers for worship. We are hoping that some of you would like to make a donation of flowers for the chapel worship service on Sunday mornings.
